


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
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A Ghostly Past



In 1817, a guard and his family sat down to eat inside the Tower of London. In horror, they saw a ghostly bottle floating in midair. A light-blue liquid bubbled inside. As the bottle neared the guard's wife, she screamed. "It has **seized** me!" The mysterious object then floated away.

Many reports of ghostly figures in the Tower had come before this one. Many more were yet to come.

The Tower Begins

In 1066, an angry William of Normandy sailed across the English Channel. King Edward had promised William that he would be the next king of England. Yet just before King Edward died, he passed the crown to his brother-in-law, Harold Godwinson.

William was determined to be England's next ruler, however. He and his army sailed from France to England. They fought and **defeated** King Harold.

After defeating King Harold, William became known as William the **Conqueror**.

As the new king of England, William built many wooden **forts** to protect his land. Around 1078, William ordered one of his wooden forts to be torn down. He replaced it with a strong stone **fortress**. It was to become the first part of the Tower of London.



The stone tower King William built is the oldest part of the Tower of London. At 90 feet (27 m) high, it was the tallest building in London at the time.
