Fire on Board!

Everything seemed fine on the evening of June 8, 1995, at Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport in Atlanta, Georgia. However, just as ValuJet Flight 597 was about to take off, the flight's **crew** and passengers heard a loud bang. Seconds later, flames and thick black smoke poured into the **cabin** where the passengers sat.

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The pilot immediately stopped the plane on the **runway** and called the control tower. "We have a fire in the right engine!" he shouted into the radio. "Roll the equipment," he continued, which meant, "Call out the **aviation** firefighters!" Within moments, they were speeding to the scene.

Atlanta Fire and Rescue

traffic controllers work in control towers. They help pilots move planes safely in the air and on the ground so that they do not crash with other aircraft. Air traffic controllers also direct aviation firefighters to fire emergencies.

One-Minute Reaction

The airport's aircraft rescue and fire fighting (ARFF) team got to the plane just one minute after the pilot's call for help. The firefighters sprayed the flames with white foam that shot out from a turret on their huge truck. Then they searched the smoky plane to see if anyone was trapped inside.

In less than 15 minutes, the ARFF team had put out the fire and helped **evacuate** everyone. Five passengers, two crew members, and one firefighter were taken to a hospital for medical treatment. Luckily, because of the firefighters' quick action, nobody died in the fire.
