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
It is a hot, dry afternoon in the desert.

A bark scorpion rests in a tree.

It hides under the tree bark to keep out of the burning sun.

During the day, the temperature can climb to I20°F (49°C).

Yet the scorpion stays cool in the shade of the bark.



Adult bark scorpions can be up to 3 inches (7.6 cm) long.

#### The bark scorpion lives in the Sonoran Desert—one of the hottest deserts in North America.

The small creature is **cold-blooded**. Its body temperature changes with the temperature of its surroundings. To keep from overheating, the scorpion stays in a shady spot while

the sun is out.

If its body becomes too hot, it will die.



The bark scorpion has a hard outer covering called an exoskeleton. This helps keep water inside the scorpion's body so it doesn't dry up in the desert heat.
