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
The lives and habits of some animals can seem horrible to us humans.

There's the bot fly, for example. When it's a larva, or maggot, it lives inside another animal. Bot fly larvae have even been found living in animals' brains!




Then there's the Komodo dragon. This giant lizard catches its food using a deadly bite, killer drool, and lots of patience.


Komodo dragon


