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
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Attacked!

It was a beautiful, sunny morning on September 11, 2001, in New York City. At 8:46 A.M. firefighters in the station house of Ladder Company 6 heard a thunderous noise. When they rushed outside to see what was causing the sound, they were shocked. Above them an airplane was flying low—too low. Seconds later the plane crashed into the 110-story North Tower of the World Trade Center. Shortly after, a second plane crashed into the South Tower. It wasn't long before U.S. officials learned that the two planes had been **hijacked**.

About two hours after being hit by the planes, both towers had collapsed. New York City was not the only place that was attacked on September 11. Another plane hit the **Pentagon** in Virginia, and one also crashed in a Pennsylvania field. Nearly 3,000 people were killed in all. Who was to blame for these terrible tragedies? A **terrorist group** called **Al Qaeda** took responsibility. The group's leader, Osama bin Laden, had organized the attacks from his base in Afghanistan. On October 7, 2001, the U.S. government sent Air Force warplanes to Afghanistan to bomb the terrorists' training camps.



War in Iraq

As the fight against terrorism continued, it expanded to Iraq. U.S. government officials believed that Saddam Hussein, the ruler of Iraq, was building powerful weapons, including **nuclear** ones, to use against the United States and other countries. They thought he needed to be stopped. As it had done in Afghanistan, the U.S. Air Force led the charge in Iraq with an air attack on March 20, 2003. Though weapons were never found, the U.S. and its **allies** were able to remove Saddam Hussein from power.
